FADE IN:

Almost total darkness, followed by Flash of Explosion, then flashes of sporadic gun fire.

CG Overlay: At 2:54 a.m. Viet Cong guerrillas blasted a hole in the concrete outer wall of the U.S. Embassy.

Middle of the night at Da Nang air base with series of explosions and more rapid small arms firing. City of Da Nang empty streets, flashes of small arms fire in the night.

CG Overlay: At 3:30 a.m. North Vietnamese forces attacked the U.S. air base at Da Nang and then attacked the city itself.

Near dawn in Hue, North Vietnamese troops and military vehicles in the streets.

<u>CG Overlay</u>: The Viet Cong and North Vietnamese Regulars are in control of most of the city of Hue.

GEORGE on camera

Early morning on the grounds of the U.S. Embassy. Bodies of both U.S. Military and Viet Cong guerrillas on the ground.

CG Overlay: They killed four U.S. military policemen and 1 U.S. Marine. Eleven other Americans were wounded before U.S. forces finally regained control of the Embassy compound.

18 guerrillas were killed and one was taken prisoner.

GEORGE on camera

FADE IN:

SFX: Explosion followed by sporadic small arms fire.

SFX: Several quick explosions followed by more small arms fire.

SFX: Military vehicle engines.

GEORGE: The North Vietnamese and the Viet Cong struck every major city and provincial capital in South Vietnam.

Not a large number of troops, but enough.....?

cEmbassy officials talk quietly in background as they inspect the carnage.

<u>GEORGE (VO)</u>: These Viet Cong forces were able to penetrate America's greatest symbol...

(pause)

GEORGE (Cont'd): ...the U.S. Embassy.

Inside a crowded and busy Associated Press Bureau office in Saigon.

SFX: Busy office, type writers, phones, many conversations in background.

GEORGE on camera

GEORGE: I was mostly in the office, doing the military round-ups, taking information from other AP correspondents.

Peter Arnett on the U.S. Embassy grounds interviewing people.

GEORGE (VO): Peter Arnett was at the U.S. embassy, but I was basically in the bureau.

GEORGE on camera

CG Overlay: Gen. Westmoreland said
the enemy attacks were a diversion...

SFX: Silence. A light breeze at most.

CG Overlay:...to take attention away from the real North Vietnamese offensive which he expected soon to come from the north across the DMZ.

GEORGE on camera

GEORGE: We had other correspondents coming in wanting to see what the AP had, to figure out where they should go.

Long shot, George on the phone

SFX: Busy office, type writers, phones, many conversations in background.

AP office busy

GEORGE (VO): It was really hectic in the office, a lot of activity. (We had) a lot of photographers in and out, stringers.

GEORGE on camera

GEORGE: Yeah, I was the focal point.

Photographers taking pictures of skirmishes on the streets.

SFX: Street sounds. Sporadic gunfire in background.

<u>CG Overlay</u>: Several AP correspondents report that marauding bands of guerrillas are still fighting in Saigon's streets.

A captured, handcuffed Viet Cong leader is brought to Police officer, attracting photographers.

Saigon Police Chief points his gun at the head of a Viet Cong leader and pulls the trigger.

CG Overlay: AP photographer Eddie Adams captured the moment a South Vietnamese Police Chief executed a Viet Cong officer with a pistol shot to the head.

FADE OUT: To Black Screen

CG Overlay 1: U.S. officials said the enemy attacked 35 population centers, hit 24 air bases—destroying 130 planes—occupied five radio stations and paralyzed several main highways.

GEORGE (VO): Eddie Adams took the photo of the ah...

SFX: Loud sound of a single gunshot.

GEORGE (VO): Emotions were very high.

SFX: Street sounds in Saigon.

GEORGE: In Saigon people were scarred.

SFX: Street sounds in Saigon.

GEORGE: There were several correspondents, none from the AP, who were executed during TET.

GEORGE (Cont'd VO): They were caught on a downtown Saigon street (pause) and executed in cold blood. (pause)

GEORGE (Cont'd): I knew them by name,
but I didn't know them well.

GEORGE (Cont'd VO): I didn't sleep. Well, none of us did.

CUT TO:

George on camera

Early days of TET Offensive when enemy troops were loose in the streets.

George on camera

American fire power—jets; helicopter gunships; rocket propelled grenades; flame throwers; etc.—targeting urban neighborhoods and shanty towns.

South Vietnamese refugees on the roads carrying their belongings, trying to keep their families together, fleeing the fighting.

<u>CG Overlay 1</u>: Tens of thousands of terrified civilians streamed from their shacks and huts in Saigon with what meager belongings they could carry.

CG Overlay 2: Nearly 200,000 frightened refugees are reported fleeing the fighting around their homes throughout South Vietnam.

Urban street fighting.

CG Overlay 3: Deaths and injuries throughout the nation are assumed to be will in the thousands.

GEORGE: I was impressed by how the Viet Cong and North Vietnamese were able to coordinate all these attacks.

GEORGE (Cont'd VO): How they were able to get in all these cities, and (they) found ways to infiltrate Saigon.

GEORGE: I also knew that they wouldn't be able to hold them (because I knew) that they'd eventually be forced back.

GEORGE (Cont'd VO):(It was pretty
obvious) with the American fire power
and...?????

<u>SFX</u>: Battle sounds in the background, voices and miscellaneous sounds of refugees on roads trying to flee the violence.

SFX: Small arms skirmishes in urban settings.
